<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Providing more playground equipment for the children to participate in active play during lunch times. - Providing training for 7 teachers in EYFS/KS1 for use of Balance Bikes. - A dance teacher was hired to deliver dance lessons in Year 6 for a term. - Participation in Sporting competitions. - Travel to sporting events and cover of staff attending sporting events. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Lunch times are more structured and the children have a better understanding of competition, teamwork, leadership and respect. - Teachers are more confident in delivering the sessions. In addition, all children in EYFS/KS1 can receive a session with the balance bikes weekly. - The children were more confident during their summer production of Willy Wonka. - Children learned different dance techniques - The school entered multiple competitions throughout the year. The highlights being the Croydon Schools Athletics event where the school won the ‘Small Schools Competition’ and the CSFA U11 Boy’s Football Competition, where the boys were runners up. - This enabled us to identify children who excel in different competitive sports and we created links with and signposted them to clubs beyond the school - This allowed more children to be able attend sporting events – for example we took 42 children in the Juniors to the Catholic Schools Cross Country event. Additionally, when staff were away at 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Hired a company to provide skilled practitioners to elevate to use of the equipment would make the new equipment even more beneficial. - Now we want to train all staff in the Infants. This would allow for the bikes to be taken out at lunchtime and would also mean children in KS1 would be able to use them during their lessons. - Provide lessons to more year groups during the 23/24 academic year. - In 23/24, the school will be entering more competitions. This will allow more children to experience competitive sports. - More sporting events will mean the cost will increase in 23/24 academic year.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Palace For Life Foundation coach was employed. - Development of PE scheme. 	<p>sporting events, the school hired skilled substitutes to cover these adults. This resulted in the children's learning not being negatively affected.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - A coach was hired to teach P.E. to all Infant children. This meant all children in the Infants were receiving a high quality P.E. lesson once a week. Additionally, they were a mentor to selected children in Year 6. This had a positive effect on their work and behaviour. - The school invested into the successful scheme (GetSet4PE) for an additional 3 years. This allows teachers to deliver outstanding PE lessons. The scheme also provides children with 'active breaks' and a link can be found on the website for families to exercise at home. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - In 2023/24, P.E. Leads to deliver CPD to all staff at the start of the academic year focused on our PE scheme – GetSet4PE and demonstrating to the teachers how to deliver an outstanding PE lessons. - The scheme has been incredibly successful in the majority of years. Some year groups may need some extra training.

Swimming Data Autumn Term

Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	55%	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Due to the pandemic this cohort didn't receive their swimming lessons when they should have. - Last year, West Norwood Leisure Centre roof was being mended, therefore we were unable to book lessons there. - We did search for alternative venues, however with the backlog due to COVID, all appropriate venues were fully booked. - Not many children have swimming lessons outside of school.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	55%	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - For target reasons outlined above most of our children were new to swimming this year. As such instead of the children having 6-8 swimming sessions/year, we extended the length of their lessons for the whole autumn term. Many children made good progress. - In Autumn 1, we also sent our P.E. Specialist who is a swimming teacher to swimming with this cohort. She entered the pool with the children to support.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	60%	As in first box, to improve the percentage of children able to do this, the swimming offering was extended for the full Autumn Term

Have you done this?</p>	<p>Yes/No</p>	<p>We are aware that our children have missed out on 3 years of swimming due to COVID. We are addressing this with our swimming provision going forward and have carefully mapped out the next 3 years to compensate for the loss of swimming teaching and progression.</p> <p>We are giving each year one full term of swimming going forward until the end of the 25/26 academic year. This ought to help improve every child's swimming ability and meet the end of KS2 objectives.</p>
<p>Have you provided CPD to improve the knowledge and confidence of staff to be able to teach swimming and water safety?</p>	<p>Yes/No</p>	<p>West Norwood Leisure Centre provides skilled swimming teachers during the sessions. They teach the children swimming.</p>
